For the rest it has been the first full year in quite a while and there are visible signs of fatigue and tiredness. Whilst it has been a long year for us there are still great things to look forward to over the coming weeks. Learning continues, skills are gained and outside of the pressure of assessment there lies a great opportunity for students to engage with great elements of the curriculum offered here at St Peter's!

Presentation Day for 7-10 is looming, our Christmas Party is on the 2 December, our Christmas Appeal is underway, and the Year 12 Students are into the first weeks of their HSC year. The Unlocked Programme in Year 9 is offering job ready skills, electives are being finalised for 2023 and reports are being written. The Year 12 formal on the 7 November was a great success and then the 2023 Year 7 students and their parents joined us on Wednesday evening for an information night and we will see the students again on the 28 November for their Orientation Day.

They serve those in need, who are homeless many of whom travel along the train lines from Sydney to Newcastle. YEAR 7 NEWS AND UPDATES

Police Liaison Office Talk

A few weeks ago, students in Year 7 had a visit and presentation by our Police Liaison Officer, Kim Smith. Her role as a School Liaison Police Officer is to work with schools in the aim to reduce youth crime, violence, and anti-social behaviour through many different intervention strategies.

Students watched a video with both male and female football players, who spoke about their experiences with violence and gangs, as well as making positive choices. They encouraged students to listen to parents, role models and inspirational people. Kim reiterated these messages, enforcing that it was okay to make mistakes, but students had to learn from them and make better choices in the future. It was also explained to the students that it is important that we make decisions for ourselves, rather than letting others influence our decision making. Students were spoken to about bullying, harassment, intimidation, the consequences

of these behaviours for both perpetrators and bystanders as well as being held accountable for our behaviour.

We encourage you to speak to your children about this presentation and hope that the students took on board the messages that Kim spoke about

Geography




ST PETER'S INAUGURAL PORTRAIT PRIZE



MATHS HELP AVAILABLE TUESDAY




Maths support is available every Tuesday during Break 1 in the Explore Zone of the Library.
