

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MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Carers and Students

As an authentic Catholic School, and part of Catholic Schools Broken Bay, we continually work on strengthening our Catholic culture and provide opportunities for our students and staff to grow in their own faith journeys. The first point in our College Mission Statement states, "At St Peter's we form young people in Catholic Discipleship" and so this is a significant part of what we do every day.

At the beginning of a new school year, it is a good time to remind ourselves what it means to be a Disciple of Christ and to explain everything that goes on at school to help our young people to discover and explore their spirituality, their faith and learn more about the Catholic teachings.

A Disciple of Christ, in simple terms, is a person who strives to be Christ-like in their actions, their thoughts and the way they treat those around them. The journey to discipleship involves learning about Christ, his life, and his purpose. However, a true disciple has more than just knowledge, they have a relationship with Christ and a desire for this relationship to grow stronger.

Each year at St Peter's we provide a range of opportunities to help students in their own spiritual journeys. Some of the opportunities provide learning and knowledge. However, many provide meaningful experiences for students that involve reflection, sharing and facilitate deepening faith and prayer life. Some of these opportunities include:

- Every Tuesday morning at 8am, Mass is said in our College Chapel. All students, staff and families are invited to join us for mass which is a beautiful way to give thanks for our family, friends, and the day we have in front of us.
- Each Wednesday one class from the College will go to Mass in the chapel. These masses are narrated so that students learn more about the mass, its format and purpose. It helps our young people understand why the mass is so significant for Catholics.

Year 12 Retreat

This week our Year 12 students are away on retreat. These retreat days are important occasions where students have a chance to reflect on their life journey so far and evaluate the choices they have made and the goals they have set. They spend time getting to know their peers at a deeper level than maybe they did previously, and they share prayer and faith experiences. When students are asked about their retreat experience, one of the terms that come up a lot is belonging. Students say that they feel like they belong to this group of people and this school after being on a retreat experience. As well as the year group retreats, St Peter's provides deeper experiences for those students who have identified a desire to take their faith journey further. Tomorrow a group of students are travelling to Canberra for 4 days to partake in the Catholic Schools Youth Ministry International (CSYMI) equipping school. This experience provides students with powerful prayer and sharing opportunities as well as targeted leadership skills.

VENIO Retreat

The following weekend another group of students are heading off on our annual VENIO retreat. This experience is for those who are inquisitive about their faith and feel a need to learn more, or for those who are wanting to discover their faith for the first time. VENIO provides a safe and non-threatening space for this to occur in the company of a number of like-minded students from across our Diocese.

World Youth Day Lisbon

Uniforms

Uniforms are strategy to support community spirit, and school pride. At St Peter's our uniforms are based on a business model and adheres to Work Health and Safety regulations protecting our students by reducing risk in practical classrooms like Science, TAS and the commercial kitchens.

Wearing the uniform correctly each day is the first expectation a student must meet when entering the school. Students who do not meet this expectation often do not meet behaviour expectations with the classroom or playground.

This means they do not start the day prepared to learn and can be disruptive in the classroom impacting the learning of others.

To assist students in meeting this basic expectation and equipping them with the mindset to be engaged in learning, any student not in correct uniform is referred to the Uniform Reflection Break 1 each day. Here we can ascertain whether the issue was forgetfulness, not having that part of the uniform due to financial constraint, or refusal to follow instruction.

Wearing the uniform correctly was a key point in the contract signed at enrolment and discussed in the enrolment interview. Any student involved in sport knows they wouldn't be allowed on the field or court if they are not correctly attired. Likewise for work. NAPLAN 2023 Information

It is that time of year when all NSW schools are organising for their students in Yr 3, 5, 7 & 9 to sit the NAPLAN tests. All Schools, Government and Independent, are required by the Federal Government to participate in the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) in Term 1. You will note that the dates for these tests is earlier than in previous years.

NAPLAN, which is a part of the National Assessment Program (NAP), is how Governments, Education Authorities and Schools can determine whether young Australians are reaching important educational goals

At St Peter's, the NAPLAN tests will be conducted on the following days as conveyed in the recent Compass post:

All Year 7 and Year 9 students will need to have the correct NAPLAN lockdown browser installed on their BYO devices. Your support in ensuring your child has this browser installed well before the scheduled test dates is much appreciated.

PAT (Progressive achievement testing)

Year 7, 9 and 10 - completed these tests in weeks 1 and 2 this term. This year's Year 8 students were tested at the end of last year.

The data from these tests will help us track student growth and provide Is with insight in understanding where students are sitting in order for us to provide targeted learning experiences. <u>https://www.acer.org/au/pat/assessments</u>

NESA - ALL MY OWN WORK

The modules for this must be completed prior to students being eligible for a Preliminary course enrolment. Students in Year 11 who have not completed these modules have been sent a reminder and are urged to complete them this week.

NESA STUDENT ONLINE accounts

Students in Year 10, 11 and 12 are encouraged to create and activate their personalised NESA STUDENTS ONLINE accounts. This allows them to see the subjects for which they are enrolled and all results achieved in Year 10 and Year 11 so far. Students will need to know their NESA student number to generate their NESA account- they will need to see Mrs Haines if they do not know this number.

Minimum Standards Tests

Students need to have reached Minimum standards in READING, WRITING and NUMERACY prior to receiving their HSC. Students are given several opportunities in Years 10-12 to demonstrate this minimum standard. We will run the first of the Year 10 sessions later this term. Students in Year 11 who have still to demonstrate will also be given opportunities to sit the Minimum standards tests this term and throughout the year. Making sure that students have their own laptop with the correct browser for these tests will ensure students are in an optimal position to sit these tests.

Year 11 Subject Changes

As we head into Week 4, most students in Year 11 should now have settled into their chosen and appropriate courses for the Preliminary course which run for Terms 1-3. Students are discouraged from making further changes at this late stage.

Stage 5 Elective Changes

This year, a change in the way the elective courses are run has meant that students in Year 9 and 10 will study 2x100 hour courses. As part of this, most elective classes will have a combination of Year 9 and Year 10 students.

Over the last 3 weeks, numerous student requests for elective subject changes have been processed. We have done our best to accommodate all requests.

As of this week, no further changes to Stage 5 elective subjects will be processed unless there are significant wellbeing concerns.

Bullying No Way

In 2022, our students participated in Bullying No Way Day where they had the opportunity to hear about the impact of bullying from the perspective of our staff here at St. Peter's who shared their personal experiences around bullying and provided an incredible insight into the damage it causes over time. Along with this they were also able to talk to our Senior Student Leaders in a smaller group capacity and have their voices heard.

Due to the success of last year, we will be running a similar seminar style session on 18 March this year. We hope that Year 9 will once again sign the No Bullying Pledge and embrace the goal of getting bullying down to zero.

PAT Testing

Progressive Achievement Tests are a series of tests designed to provide objective, norm-referenced information to teachers about their students' skills and understandings in a range of key areas.

ACER'S Progressive Achievement approach is used in thousands of schools in Australia and around the world. The approach focuses on assessing and monitoring student growth over time and is underpinned by an understanding that students of the same age, and in the same year of school, can be at very different points in their learning development.

Year 9 will be sitting the PAT test this week. These tests are to inform the teachers about how to improve students' skills and understandings and the results are not reflected in the students' marks or reports. They will be on: Tuesday Period 3, Wednesday Period 3 and Friday Period 1.

All students will need to have their laptops fully charged and ready to use for this period each day.

Extra-Curricular Opportunities

This year there will be many opportunities for Year 9 to embrace their learning and pursue excellence beyond that of the classroom. The St Peter's Student Representative Council is back up and running this year and they meet in the library on Mondays in Break 1; they are still looking for more members so if you're interested go and join. Mr Little and Mr Hawkins are working behind the scenes with sporting teams throughout the year. Students are encouraged to check the notices on Compass to keep up to date with these as they unfold.

On top of these we also have camp running in Term 3. This year students will have the option of choosing between three different locations: Wee Jasper, Surf Camp and Lake Burrendong. More details and information regarding these will come throughout the year and we will communicate this information home as well as we get closer to the date.

Since 2009 the First Class Exhibition at the Museum of Art and Culture, yapang has celebrated and showcased the exceptional standard of work produced by HSC Visual Arts Students from the Hunter and Central Coast regions. Selected from submissions produced in the previous year, the exhibition continues to embrace the diversity of media and techniques that represent the wide scope of the NSW HSC Visual Arts syllabus. The exhibition honours the wonderful talents of the Central Coast's local HSC students.

In 2022, Ashlee Marsden was amongst the elite students who were selected to show their Year 12 major work at the exhibition. Ashlee's 'Body of Work' "Intertwined" features large and small scale hand built, ceramic vessels, incorporating hessian and twine that has been pressed, stitched, and woven into the work. These artworks are an exploration of natural materials and symbolise fractured, repaired and bonded relationships.

During the Year 8 single sport periods, the students have been learning new skills in the areas of Rugby Touch, Boxing, AFL and Basketball.

Year 9 and 10 started their double sports last week. Some of the sports on offer were Golf, Tennis, Surf Survival, Lawn Bowls, Beach Activities, Castle Gym Strength Training, Mingara Group Fitness, and Indoor Sports at Tumbi and Niagara Park. All students displayed exemplary behaviour when out in the community and demonstrated the college guiding principle of 'Care For Self And Others Through Positive Wellbeing'.

The Targeted League Program is up and running again for Year 9 and 10 Girls and Boys this year under the guidance of Mr Hawkins and Mr Marquart. We are hoping the 2023 version is just as successful as the 2022 cohort.

Year 9 students wishing to go on Surf Camp later in the year have started their Surf Survival Training under the guidance of Mr Lawicki in single and double sport lessons. This skills learnt in this program is not only valuable for Surf Camp, but may allow the students to be prepared to save themselves, a loved one or even a member of the community in the future.

Finally, the Sport Department has changed the Roles of the Sport Co-ordinators this year to align with their expertise and the growing number of students at the College. Jacob Hawkins is taking over the Representative Sport Co-ordinator role in charge of Representative Teams and Performance, and brings his passion and experience to coaching many of our College teams. 2023 IMMUNISATION SCHEDULES & INFORMATION

NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

In 2023 the following vaccines will be offered. If your child is in Year 7 or Year 10 this year, you can now provide online consent for their routine school vaccinations.

In Year 7, students are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received.

How to provide consent:

- 1. To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, visit:
- https://nswhealth.service-now.com/school 2.Follow the steps to log in to your existing ServiceNSW account. This is the same account you may already use to renew your driver's licence. If you don't have a ServiceNSW account, refer to ServiceNSW to create one.
- 3.Update or confirm your personal details in ServiceNSW as required.
- 4. Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your child/ren. You will need to:
 - a) Enter your child's personal details
 - b) Provide the Medicare card details for you and your child
 - c) Read the linked Parent Information Sheet and privacy statement
 - d) Provide consent
- 5. If you or your child do not have a Medicare card, consent can still be provided by requesting a paper-based consent form directly from your child's school.
- The benefits of providing consent online:
- easily update your child's details
- receive SMS and/or email notifications when vaccinations are given
- faster upload of vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).

St Peter's Vaccination Clinic Dates

In 2023 students in Years 7, 8, 10 and 11 will be offered the following vaccinations:

- Year 7 Human Papillomavirus (HPV) (2 dose course) and Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis (dTpa)
- Year 8 HPV and dTpa (this is a catch up program for students who returned consent forms in <u>2022</u>)
- Year 10 Meningococcal ACWY
- Year 11 Meningococcal ACWY (this is a catch up program for students who returned a consent form in <u>2022</u> for Year 11, but missed this vaccination whilst in Year 10).

The vaccinations DO NOT include any COVID-19 vaccinations.

Dates for the vaccinations at St Peter's are as follows:

- Visit 1 MONDAY 15 MAY 2023 YEAR 7 PLUS YEAR 8 CATCH-UP
- Visit 2 **TUESDAY 6 JUNE** YEAR 10 PLUS YEAR 11 CATCH-UP YEAR 7 & YEAR 8 CATCH-UP
- Vist 3 WEDNESDAY 20 SEPTEMBER YEAR 7 PLUS YEAR 8 CATCH-UP YEAR 10 & YEAR 11 CATCH-UP

For Year 8, and 11 students requiring catch up vaccinations, their consent forms have been retained by the immunisation team and the names of these students will be emailed to the College prior to the first school clinic.

Please note if a student is absent on the day of the vaccination clinic and their parents have consented to the vaccination, the consented vaccination will be offered to the student at the next available clinic date.

Parents are also advised that they are able to withdraw their consent at any time if they have previously consented. To do so please contact the College to discuss.

Road safety education Bus Safety Week 2023 20-26 February

We all have a part to play

Be Bus Aware highlights the importance of bus safety for all road users. Buses are large, heavy vehicles and can't stop quickly.

Bus Safety Week will run from Monday, 20 February to Sunday, 26 February 2023. The annual campaign raises awareness for all road users on how to stay safe on and around buses, helping to reduce injuries and fatalities.

Millions of trips

NSW has one of the largest metropolitan bus fleet in Australia. Almost 4000 buses operate in the Sydney area, while another 1000 buses service the Newcastle, Wollongong and Blue Mountains areas. In addition, more than 3000 bus services operate in rural and regional NSW.

From 2018 to 2022 (provisional), 32 people lost their lives in crashes involving buses. Of the 32 fatalities, 13 people were pedestrians, six were drivers (of vehicles other than a bus), six were motorcyclists, four were bus drivers, two were passengers (of vehicles other than a bus) and one was a pedal cyclist.

Pedestrians

Pedestrians are our most vulnerable road users and make-up almost half of all fatalities from bus crashes.

Bus Safety Week promotes safety for pedestrians, who should:

- Plan ahead and don't rush for the bus
- Obey traffic signals and cross with care
- Avoid being distracted by mobile devices
- Stand back from the kerb when waiting for a bus
- Wait until the bus has gone then use a safe place to cross the road.

Our Zero Emission Buses are helping us achieve our goals to respond to climate change. They're much quieter and reduce noise pollution, so remember to always stay alert when walking around buses and traffic.

Parents and carers

School-aged children might seem independent, but they still need a hand.

Remember:

- Always meet your child AT school or the bus stop. NEVER wait on the opposite side of the road and call them across.
- Always supervise your child and hold their hand when walking to and from the bus stop or interchange and when crossing the road until they are at least 10
- Wait until the bus has gone then use a safe place to cross the road
- Encourage your child to take a seat quickly when they get on the bus and to buckle up if the bus has seatbelts.

Drivers

We know that because of their sheer size and mass, buses cause severe outcomes for other road users in crashes. Buses can't stop quickly and drivers should:

- Give way to buses
- Not merge too closely in front of buses
- Keep a safe distance from buses in front of you
- Slow down to 40km/h when bus lights are flashing, unless a lower speed limit applies
- Be aware of a bus's blind spots at the front, rear and sides of the bus.

Passengers

All bus passengers should:

- Press the button well before your stop to give the driver plenty time to stop safely
- Wait until the bus has stopped before you get out of your seat
- Buckle up if the bus has seatbelts.

Working together

Our campaign has been developed with input from the State Transit Authority, Bus NSW, Transport for NSW, and the NSW Police Force. The Department of Education, the Catholic Education Commission, the Association of Independent Schools and the Kids and Traffic Early Childhood Road Safety Education Program at Macquarie University also support Be Bus Aware and Bus Safety Week.

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
MATHS HELP EVERY TUESDAY
